

U.S. History 9

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DESCRIPTION

This course covers from the Civil War to post-9/11 America. Students will examine America's emergence as a world power, a century of conflict abroad, major social and political changes of the 20th Century, and events and policies that shape the America of today.

CONTENT

Throughout this class, students will consider the following:

- What made America finally accept its role as a world power and global protector?
- What were the causes and remedies for the Great Depression?
- How did World War II affect all corners of society, from the front lines, to the factories at home, to the baby boom and postwar economic fluorescence?
- How did the Cold War change America?
- What impact did the Civil Rights movement have on our country, and in what ways is it still unfinished today?
- What factors led to the 9/11 attack, and how has the American government decided to respond?
- *How did decisions made over the last 100 years affect the world we live in today?*

REQUIRED MATERIALS

- **Folder or binder:** Students will receive many handouts, notetakers, supplemental readings, and content guides. It is the student's responsibility to collect these materials, and organize them as they see fit.
- **Pen or pencil:** Blue, black, or gray ink/lead only, please.

METHODS OF ASSESSMENT

1. **Homework and in-class assignments are** never “busy work.” Consequently, everything assigned is chosen specifically to introduce or reinforce key ideas. A student’s success hinges on completing homework and in-class work, and both should be taken quite seriously.
2. **Quizzes** are given at least once every two weeks, usually at 25 points each. Occasionally one will be unannounced. It is the student’s responsibility to stay on top of the material.
3. **Tests** will be given at the end of each unit – roughly once every three weeks. Each test will be worth at least 100 points. A cumulative **final exam** will be given at the end of each semester.
4. **Projects** are assigned once per grading period, and offer every student an opportunity to showcase his or her individual skills and creativity. Each project will be explained in depth upon assignment.

LATE WORK

I accept late work only until the Friday after which it is assigned. No late work will be accepted once the weekend has passed. Credit given for late work is half of what an on-time assignment would have been graded. *Homework submitted later the same day – or later in the class – is considered late.*

GRADING

According to district policies: A: 100-92%, B: 91-83%, C: 82-74%, D: 73-65%, E: below 65%. A 91.5% will be rounded to 92%. A 91.4% will be rounded to 91%.
